My Tasting Notes:

Colour: Dark copper

Nose: Massive with cherries and berries, candied orange zest, hints of eucalyptus, a good whiff of a well-stocked cigar

humidor, densely interwoven mild spices and a hard to describe 'earthy freshness'.

Palate: The fruitiness feels fresher than on the nose, with lime, kumquats, and hints of red currant with a minimal bitternes that is weak enough not to be disturbing, then hints of perfumed tea and those lovley spices again.

Finish: Very long with fruits and spices playing together and giving way to a little smoke at the very end. Overall: This is a truly great whisky and not really what you would expect from a heavily sherried malt. Over the decades, wood spice and sherry fruit have blended into something unique here. My tasting notes just scratch the

surface.

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

Karuizawa 1964 for Poland

secrets: the release of an extraordinary 1964 Karuizawa. Drawn from cask #3603 after more than 48 years of maturation, this is the oldest Karuizawa released to date. Michal Kowalski of the Polish investment company Wealth Solutions wanted a worthy follow-up to his Glenfarclas 1953 and he knew, right from the start, this was going to be a Karuizawa. It was a long process from wish to reality - we were there when the whole project was conceived and were honoured to be able to help in small ways along the road - and the loving care and attention to detail Michal surrounded this exceptional whisky with is simply beyond words.

Today, we're delighted to be able to finally share one of the best-kept whisky

Most whisky enthusiasts will remember the Glenflarclas 1953, bottled on 13 February 2012. The 1964 Karuizawa will be launched in Warsaw exactly one year later. If Michal keeps doing this annually, Poland will probably be the best place on earth to be for the whisky enthusiast on Valentine's Day. Just to get the facts out of the way: cask #3603 was filled on 1 September 1964 and bottled at cask-strength (57.7% abv) on Christmas Eve 2012. It yielded a mere 143 bottles - all of which have been presold to Wealth Solutions clients. One lone bottle will be available from Master of Malt, but not for very long, I suspect.



The presentation is absolutely top-notch: a bespoke, heavyweight version of the traditional Karuizawa bottle is housed in a beautiful wooden box with a front made of Polish black fossil oak with the characters for "Karuizawa" engraved in it. The wood is hundreds of years old and has been recovered from ancient Polish swamps - this is a reference to the last character in the name "Karuizawa", which means "swamp". Each bottle comes with a full-colour, 35-page book, containing a fascinating appreciation of Karuizawa distillery written by Dave Broom as well as tasting notes by 6 writers/bloggers (Broom, Dominic Roskrow, Marcin Miller, Neil and Joel of Cask Strength & Carry On, Serge Valentin and yours truly).



*Nose: starts off with a prelude of annin dofu (almond tofu) and maraschino cherries,

which soon gives way to a triple fugue of forest notes, tree fruit notes and waxed

wood notes. The initial interplay is between the forest notes: suggestive of a forest in spring after rain, incredibly fresh, with hints of pine trees, boulder fern, sandalwood and a feint eucalyptus note. Soon after, seemingly out of nowhere, fruit notes start to appear: overripe apricots, Yubari melon (a Hokkaido cantaloupe variety), nashi (Japanese pears), some dates in the background. Underneath these are subtle hints of blood oranges and ruby grapefruits. On the back of these fruit notes, something reminiscent of a recently polished chapel starts to develop, with some freshly-baled hay, heather honey and a hint of freshly-crushed pink pepper thrown in the mix. Water tends to foreground the fruit notes, pushing green apples and underripe peach notes to the fore; it also brings some wet grass drying in the sun to the party. Palate: the nose sets up certain expectations, but the palate gracefully sidesteps these expectations, only to reveal a whole new dimension - such is the complexity

of this whisky. Neat, the initial impressions are acerola, brambles, gooseberries and orange liqueur. There's also a distinct kashiwa mochi (rice cake wrapped in oak leaf) note. The sour - pleasantly sour, that is - flavours soon give way to an equally pleasant and seductive bitterness: goya, walnut skins, kale-and-green-apple juice, and an ever so slight liquorice note. As if that's not beguiling enough, water brings out a prominent sudachi (a Japanese citrus fruit) note - something I never thought I'd find in a whisky but there it is! How a whisky this old can be this refreshing is just one of the great mysteries of the universe. The finish is medium-long with hints of kiwi jam, also lingonberry jam, sweet-and-sour sauce, goya again, and an incredibly delicate sweetness at the centre of it all.



It's fairly common for commentators to compliment mature whiskies on how young and vibrant they are despite their old age. This 1964 Karuizawa is far beyond such platitudes. Let's not pretend: only time - and a large dose of luck - could have conspired to make it what it is. And what it is, is one of those rare whiskies that creates a world of its own and holds it together so beautifully it's almost like an image of nature at its best. "

Here is some breaking news from the world of high end Whiskies, and I am sure that this will be music to the ears of whisky investors. Wealth solutions, in conjunction with One Drinks Co is releasing an Old rare Whisky the likes of which you rarely see. Read on to find out more:

Cask #3603 from Karuizawa, filled on 1st September 1964 and bottled on Christmas Eve 2012, is one of the oldest Japanese single malt whiskies in history. At the time of bottling it was the oldest expression of the now-closed Karuizawa. Only 143 individually-numbered bottles will be available.

Number One Drinks Company acquired the last casks of Karuizawa in August 2011 and this is one of the legendary distillery's most ancient casks. Matured for over 48 years in a 400 litre sherry oak cask, the whisky lay undisturbed in a traditional dunnage warehouse at Karuizawa before being transferred to Chichibu where it was bottled at cask strength (57.7% abv). It is naturally coloured and non-chill filtered to retain maximum flavour, mouth feel and integrity. Cask #3603 is one of the very few Karuizawa casks left from the 1960s.

Karuizawa matures magnificently over an extended period, as shown by this bottling.

- "Absolutely top drawer whisky and a treat from start to finish. 94/100," observed prolific whisky author Dominic Roskrow.
- · "First, it's brilliant whisky, and second, it's 'different' whisky. Respect. 95/100," added Serge Valentin, a whisky expert and Malt Maniac, who recently named Karuizawa as one of only six Grand Cru Classé single malts in his personal ranking.
- It's fairly common to compliment mature whiskies on how young and vibrant they are despite their old age. This 1964 Karuizawa is far beyond such platitudes. Only time and a large dose of luck could have conspired to make this; a rare whisky that creates a world of its own and holds it together so beautifully, like an image of nature at its best," commented Stefan van Eycken, blogger and editor of Nonjatta, the leading Japanese whisky website.

Polish black fossil oak

As befits this extraordinary whisky, the presentation is exceptional. A bespoke, heavyweight version of the traditional Karuizawa bottle is housed in a dark wooden box with a front made of Polish black fossil oak.



"The fossil oak is symbolic: the last part of the name 'Karuizawa' means swamp. This oak is hundreds of years old and has been recovered from ancient Polish swamps,"

said Marcin Miller, Managing Director of Number One Drinks Company.

Each bottle is presented with a specially commissioned book by Dave Broom, the leading authority on Japanese whisky, who states:



"Karuizawa is Japanese whisky unlike any other. It is big, it is bold, it has solidity and weight, it is richly fruited, it revels in its oiliness, it has smoke, but has retained the very Japanese qualities of heightened aroma and precision of flavor."

This limited edition of Karuizawa whisky was bottled exclusively for clients of Wealth Solutions, so you will be lucky to get a bottle, but its always worth keeping a look out, as you never know...



UPDATE: Word on Facebook is:

Regardless its all but over and done with for the moment. All the bottles have been sold, and if you want some now, you are looking at an auction or buying it via a private deal.

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Karuizawa 1964, Oldest Karuizawa ever bottled

A few days ago I received a miniature of this **Karuizawa 1964**. This is the second special release done by Wealth Solutions, whose mission is to provide unique (and expensive!) products to Polish collectors and investors, after an incredible 58 years old Glenfarclas.

This Karuizawa is bottled from the left stock of the distillery that closed it doors just after turning into the new millennia. Number One Drinks acquired all the existing casks of Karuizawa in August 2011 and they have provided this sensational cask for Wealth Solutions.



This special Japanese whisky has been bottled by Wealth Solutions from one of the oldest and few remaining 1960s cask of Karuizawa. This cask #3603 was a 400 litres Olosoro sherry Oak Butt. It has been bottled at 57.7% ABV.

It was filled on 1st September 1964 and bottled on Christmas Eve 2012 which makes it one of the oldest Japanese whisky ever bottled with 48 years old. Barely 143 bottles of this whisky will be available (greedy angels!).

There are several things that make Karuizawa quite unique and a tragic lost: they used only Golden Promise barley for their whiskies that although produces less alcohol on distillation create better whiskies when aged for a long time, they used peated malt from Scotland until they decided to start using in 1990s unpeated malt in a last try to catch with japanese consumers and to be my surprise most of the whisky was sold for blending. So in fact it is a real miracle to have this whisky in my hands.

Let's taste it (haha! Sorry, I am going to taste, you keep reading) and then I share my thoughts.

"Gorgeous! This Karuizawa has one of the best sherried noses that I have ever seen. Not a whisky for newcomers, it needs time and lots of attention to disclose it greatness. The more it is on the glass the more I like it"

Bottled at a whopping 48 years old this Karuizawa is a stunning whisky bottled by Wealth Solutions from one of the oldest casks ever released.

Aged for 48years on Oloroso Butt number 3603 and bottled at an incredible 57.7% ABV. Only 143 bottles worldwide.

This dram has a mahogany-like color.

Nose (95): more than average nuts, citrus, wood, spices, chocolate, citrus, pine. One of the best Oloroso noses that I have ever tasted. Just grant it a good amount of time to open.

Palate (94): dry, powerful, honey, citrus, wood, spices,





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

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KARUIZAWA 1964 [NUMBER ONE DRINKS]

The Karuizawa 1964 is the oldest Kaurizawa released to date. It hails from cask #3603 and has spent over 48 years maturing in Japan in a 400 litre sherry oak cask following its filling on 1 September 1964 and bottling 24 December 2012. The vast majority of its life was spent in a dunnage warehouse at the now sadly closed Karuizawa distillery before it was moved to Chichibu for bottling. After 48 years the whisky is still an incredibly high 57.7% ABV; this is down to a variety of factors - high filling strength and a maturation in a microclimate in which the temperature and humidity combine to force the water to evaporate before the alcohol does. This also ensures that the aromas and flavours in the whisky are concentrated giving us this fantastic spirit almost half a century later.



This expression has been bottled by Number One Drinks exclusively for Poland, for clients of Wealth Solutions, and is presented exquisitely in a crafted wooden box (the front of which is made from Polish black fossil oak), with an accompying signed book edited by Dave Broom. The label is a masterpiece in simplicity and understatement featuring only the strokes of Japanese calligraphy merely telling you what the whisky is - the presentation is a joy. Master of Malt did have one bottle for sale; sadly it is no longer available.



The whisky was sold for £9000 a bottle which leads to the sample we were sent to be worth an almighty £640 for 50ml. How do you even prepare to drink something like this? Do you sit in a sterile environment? Do you ensure your palate is at its cleanest? What do you do? In the end we did little differently. We decided to enjoy two whiskies prior to the 1964. We had a delicate Bunnahabhain and then to set the scene enjoyed a Karuizawa (Spirit of Asama 55%) to help introduce the following whisky. This really helped relax and awaken the nose and palate, and the fact that we treated this like a normal tasting allowed us to enjoy and savour the whisky. It was natural, with friends and the spirit shone.



The notes below are only a glimpse into this whisky; you really need to taste it to appreciate how good this dram is. It is safe to say that this is a once in a lifetime moment. Stunning.

Nose: Beautiful, deep and complex, there are a myriad of layers to

unravel from this incredibly concentrated scent. We detected notes of marzipan, rich stollen, cherry and dark chocolte liqueur chocolates. This was wrapped in a menthol wave that become stronger as we smelt it. Following that came worn out leather, kiwi black boot polish, and some lovely deep smelling plums

and dates. Finally fizzy cola cube sweets were discovered.

Palate: Incredibly hot, almost painfully so as you swirl it around the mouth for an elongated period of time. The whisky offered more cherry, marzipan and mint before throwing in bay leaves, orange oils, white pepper and saffron. This intensified into some chewy liquurice with hints of pecan nuts before dissolving into a homemade orange soufflé.

Finish: Huge. Cloying, floral, hot, fruity and long.



often banded around and overused. Not in this case - this spirit is epic. Is it worth £9000 a bottle? Impossible for us to say, although we can appreciate the value due to the scarcity and brilliance of the liquid. What we can tell you is that this whisky is worth the hype it has generated; every facet of it is sublime and it is almost certainly the best whisky we have ever tasted. Few whiskies make me smile fondly as I write about them. This one sees me practically grinning. It is a seminal moment in our tasting history, brought about by a fantastic whisky that has aged beautifully and gracefully. It is utterly superb.



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





Tasting Karuizawa twenty years apart (1984 – 1964)

Yes, Karuizawa again. But I wouldn't like you to think that I'm neglecting my Yamazakis or Yoichis (or other fine Japanese), I promise I'll organise some ultra long verticales pretty soon. As for the dreadful St Valentin(e) - yup that's today -, don't get me started...



Karuizawa 1984/2012 (61.6%, Number One Drinks Company, sherry butt, cask #3692, 359 bottles) Colour: dark red amber. Nose: a gun that just fired, reminds me of my days in the army (conscription). So yeah, a lot of gunpowder and struck matches, and even truffles at first nosing, but no hard boiled eggs, asparagus or cooked cabbage in there. So no mercaptan/thiols, luckily. What's more, as often those notes tend to go away, leaving room for quite some chocolate and raspberry jelly. Now, it's very strong, so ... With water: goes toward dried porcinis, cigars, soy sauce, balsamic vinegar and, maybe, even old Parmesan cheese. Also bags and bags of roast chestnuts -I don't think I ever got that that loudly. All that is quite lovely. Mouth (neat): rich and powerful, it's more some kind of ultraheavy jam at this point. Prunes, Armagnac, black pipe tobacco and a tarry/smoky side that may come from the high strength. Let's see... With water: this time it became a little gamy and very dry, with this gunpowder that came back. Bitter chocolate, some ginger, heavy herbal liqueur (starting with a J., dear) or even this weird thing called Schinken häger. Ever tried that? Finish: long, dry, very chocolaty. Quite some white pepper. Smokier and ashier aftertaste. Comments: I think you have to like gunpowder to enjoy this baby, which doesn't necessarily mean you need be a belligerent person (S., you're tired). Not utterly stellar in my opinion but quality's very high, no doubt. SGP:463 - 89 points.



Karuizawa 1964/2012 (57.7%, Number One Drinks for Wealth Solutions, Poland, cask #3603, 143 bottles) **** This magnifico bottle was just launched on Feb 13 in Warsaw. Colour: rich amber. Nose: rather than smoky and chocolaty like some other old Karuizawas could be, this one is full of overripe fruits and the jams made thereof, with many spices and sappy 'things' in the background. In fact, it's quite extraordinary. Strawberries with menthol? Figs and marzipan? Dates and liquorice? Quinces with some putty? There's even something coastal that's growing and growing, but the whole rather makes me think of some glorious very old but terrifyingly vibrant sherried Speysider that would have sucked a little extra-menthol out of a magnificent cask. And maybe a little beef stock at the same time... With water: Karuizawa really loves water, the whisky became even more fabulous and incredibly complex. Some fruitcake especially made for a very wealthy and completely mad dictator? Mouth (neat): what the hell is this? I've never found this is any malt whisky... Some kind of overripe tropical fruits, maybe longans? There's also this curious cheesy side, absolutely wonderful (in this context!) New Comté or other fruity Jurassian cheese? There's also a lot of oak, which is normal, but what's important, I think, is that it's all perfectly integrated. Add to that some tangerine liqueur, black pepper, cumin, cloves, grape pips (ha, resveratrol!)... All that is very big, it's almost a monster of a whisky. With water: these wonderfully strange notes grew even bigger. Swiss cheese with mango jam. Finish: endless, with the spices singing many songs. No I won't list them all, do not worry. Bitter chocolate in the aftertaste (tannins, but no worries). Comments: first it's brilliant whisky, and second, it's 'different' whisky. Respect. I'm sorry, but that'll be SGP:571 -95 points.
